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
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everyone should have the opportunity to be successful in life.

Mr. Ervin Queen

The founding father of PRIDE Community Services, Inc. Mr. Ervin Queen, was a leader and innovator who, without question, had a heart and love for the people of Logan County as well as the state of West Virginia. Mr. Queen was a leader on the forefront of the community action movement helping to establish PRIDE as one of the very first community action agencies in the state. His work spanned well beyond Logan County. He was a leader in local, regional, state and national initiatives and a true believer in the Community Action moto "To Help Others Help Themselves". Mr. Queen was well known and respected on the national stage as well, helping to craft legislation and progress the community action movement all across the country. With Mr. Queen's passing on February 20, 2006, Community Action lost one of the greatest builders of ideas and unifiers of people and causes. In his memory, the WV Community Action Partnership established the Ervin Queen Award. It is pre-

sented annually to an individual who, through long-term leadership and service, embodies the spirit of hope and improves the lives of low-income citizens.

At this year's WV CAP Conference, I had the pleasure of presenting the Ervin Queen Award to our very own Mrs. Brenda York. Brenda is an exemplary specimen of community action and the ideals that Mr. Queen had for PRIDE and community action. Brenda York started working for PRIDE in 1984. Since then, Brenda has worked in many capacities at PRIDE from Head Start, to Child Care, to Weatherization to Medicaid and Waiver, then finally moving into the Finance Department where she now handles program operations and purchasing. Brenda York has seen and done it all at PRIDE. Brenda worked with Mr. Queen on multiple projects throughout the years. Brenda was here when the staff was given notice that they may not receive another pay day, and even volunteered to work at PRIDE for free. When Brenda got married, she had her wedding in the senior dining hall at PRIDE. Brenda York is PRIDE and Community Action.

Here at PRIDE Community Services, we offer many programs to help individuals and families in our communities. One vital program that serves the elderly in Logan County is our home delivered meal program. This program provides nearly 25,000 meals per year to homebound seniors in need. Not only is a hot, nutritious meal provided to our clients but another very important service is given to these individuals – contact. Often, the friendly conversation with our meal delivery personnel is the only contact our clients have on a daily basis. This can also serve as a welfare check for frail or at-risk individuals.

Recently, the need for home delivered meals in Logan County has grown exponentially. Due to budget cuts at the federal and state levels, providing adequate staffing levels is a challenge. However, you can help us make sure no senior in need goes hungry. We gladly accept and greatly appreciate volunteers to help deliver meals to homes in our service area. Volunteering for our home-delivered meal program is a great way to make a huge impact in a short amount of time.

Delivery volunteers are needed Monday through Friday and delivery hours generally range from 9:30 am to 11:30am. PRIDE will provide a thorough orientation and training program at convenient times that include a 'ride along' with an experienced meal delivery driver prior to starting volunteer service. Head Start is the national commitment to give every child, regardless of circumstances at birth, an opportunity to succeed in school and in life. In the 50 years since its inception, Head Start has improved the lives of more than 32 million children and their families. Head



Start alumni or "Head Start babies", as they often call themselves, are in all walks of the nation's life. Educators, doctors, lawyers, military personnel, artists, engineers, religious



and civic leaders and scientists from all across the country remember Head Start as the place where, at an early age, they acquired a life-long love of learning.

In addition to life and school preparedness, Head Start is also the nation's laboratory for early learning innovation. Head Start offers a unique whole child/whole family program design coupled with a delivery

system that includes local programs, national standards, monitoring, professional development and family engagement.

The children in the PRIDE Head Start classrooms have enjoyed many learning activities recently, such as Dr. Seuss' Birthday, St. Patrick's Day, attending book fair and bowling with recycled bottles.

PRIDE Head Start Centers are located at Lorado, Dehue, Mill Creek and Chapmanville as well as classrooms in the Logan County Board of Education elementary schools. Brenda is dedicated to PRIDE and its mission. Brenda often talks about how Mr. Queen's philosophy was no matter the issue, never turn anyone away; Brenda still follows that philosophy today. Brenda believes no one should ever be denied assistance, even if we do not have a program to meet that need or it is something small, there may be an opportunity for us to help those in need. There have been many instances in which Brenda has volunteered to pay for things out of her own pocket to make sure the clients received some assistance in their pursuit of self-sufficiency. This just isn't Brenda's philosophy at work, this is Brenda's attitude in her personal life as well. While shopping at a local grocery store, Brenda noticed the vehicle of an employee there with completely worn out tires. Brenda "investigated," as she refers to it, and discovered the woman was a single mother and simply could not afford to purchase new tires. Brenda called a local maintenance garage and purchased two new tires for this lady. When the owner of the garage heard the story and what Brenda had done, he offered to donate the other two tires. The lady was then able to travel safely to and from work, in order to support her children and take a step toward moving out of poverty. Another example, Brenda frequents a local Chinese restaurant in town. While eating there one afternoon, she discovered the owners had a little girl who would have been eligible for our Head Start program and in need of assistance. Because of the language barrier, the owners had been hesitant to enroll the child. Brenda worked with them, helping complete necessary paperwork, taking them around to the community resources and ultimately helping the parents enroll the child in Head Start so she could access the services she needed. In addition to the work she does at PRIDE, Brenda volunteers her time to work with the Logan County Community Thanksgiving Dinner. Brenda goes out search-

ing for homeless and those less fortunate so that she can tell them about the dinner and other services available to them in Logan County. Most recently, the Thanksgiving dinner served over 2000 dinners. These are just a few examples of how Brenda lives her life every day and why she was chosen as the recipient of the Ervin Queen Award. Brenda encompasses the philosophy of community action and what Mr. Queen's vision was ultimately about.

Weatherization

Spring is coming!

Here are some quick easy things to do in order keep more cash in your pocket!

*Open doors and windows for a cross breeze rather than using central air conditioning.

*Use ceiling fans on warm days. Ceiling fans can lower the temperature feeling by about 4 degrees in a room.

*Use a garden hose to spray your outdoor central air unit and clean the fins protecting it.

*Make sure gutters and downspouts are clean to avoid additional groundwater reaching the basement.

*Control your heat system by raising/lowering the thermostat during the day when not needed, and setting back 1-4 degrees at night.

*Take advantage of the longer daylight hours, and open blinds and curtains for light. Turn off lights in rooms not being used. Dust light bulbs, you may be surprised at the increased light they give off.

*Hang clothes outdoors to dry on a nice spring day.

*Check your outside hose hookups/ faucets for leaks.

*Check your furnace filter monthly. Check your registers to make sure they are not blocked by furniture an the vent covers are clean during spring cleaning.

*Get out ! Save electricity by getting outside during nice weather, and walking or biking rather than taking your car when possible.
