Page 10 Important Dates As we continue to fight through the pandemic, PRIDE Community Services Inc. continues to excel in the face of adversity. Recently, PRIDE's Emergency Repair and Replacement Program (ERRP) crew had the opportunity to provide services to Mrs. Linda Gillman of Whitman, WV who desperately needed our services. Mrs. Gillman had been using a small heater and her oven to heat the home, causing her power bill to skyrocket. After explaining the ERRP Program to her, she was thrilled that such a service was available in her area. The home was in desperate need of heating, and we were happy to provide our expertise.

Precision Heating, Cooling, and Electrical, a trusted contractor of PRIDE Community Services Inc. was chosen for this job. The team installed a 2 Ton split HVAC system, floor registers, new thermostat, and Smoke and Carbon Monoxide alarms to ensure her safety. Mrs. Gilman was very complimentary of the Precision HVAC team, declaring that they were "hard workers" and "extremely professional". During the post inspection performed by the ERRP Coordinator, she said "PRIDE is a wonderful organization and our community is extremely blessed to have such a great staff that cares about their community".

PRIDE's ERRP Program is a partnership with the DHHR Low-income Home Energy Assistance Program that allows WV Community Action Agencies to administer the Emergency Repair and Replacement Program (ERRP). The ERRP program aids households in need of emergency heat (i.e. repair or replace malfunctioning or non-operable heating units).





Senior Services



PRIDE's Senior Services staff are still ensuring that each senior receives nutritional meals throughout the week. We are currently serving meals through our home delivered, grab-and-go, and senior summer feeding programs. Any senior 60 or older may sign up for meals with these three options. Participants are being added to our meals weekly. For the 2019-2020 program year covering Oct. 1st - Sept. 30th, PRIDE served 55,898 meals. Five months in to our 2020-2021 program year, PRIDE has already served 24,381 meals to our seniors.

Our beloved seniors who visited PRIDE's congregate sites have not been able to come in for their meals or socialize with each other since the pandemic hit in March 2020. We truly miss seeing and interacting with the senior participants. 2021 is still bringing changes and uncertainty but our wonderful staff has continued pushing through to serve our seniors. We would like to recognize and thank our hard working, diligent Senior Services staff for a job well done!

Supportive Services for Veteran Families

Back in July, Brian Montgomery and his wife stopped by our office and informed us that they had been staying in their vehicle and didn't have any place to go. He was a previous SSVF client. PRIDE provided shelf-stable food and put them in a hotel until more stable housing could be found. In late August, a stable rental unit was secured and PRIDE helped them get utilities. They did well and we were able to help them through December 2020. At that time, a referral was made to the HUD-VASH program. HUD-VASH is the same as HUD but it's Veteran specific, with no waiting list as long as there are HUD Vouchers available. After a few weeks of paperwork and several visits later, Brian and his wife were approved. HUD-VASH now pays their rent.

Brian exited from the SSVF Program in January 2021 and is now stably housed. Brian has sent several messages thanking PRIDE and the SSVF Program for the assistance provided.



BuildJobs Initiative Program

The BuildJobs Initiative Program provides on-the-job training to those who have been economically affected by the decline in the coal industry. This program is 16 weeks in duration and 14 of those weeks are spent with partnered contractors learning a new trade. The trades offered are contracting, electrical, plumbing, HVAC, and welding. Upon completing the program, the participant either receives a training card or we assist with study materials and pay for them to take a certification exam. PRIDE Community Services provides the participants with a stipend check and worker's compensation coverage during training. We are currently looking to expand our list of partnered contractors in our servicing counties:

We are also accepting applications to join the BuildJobs Initiative program. The applicant must complete the application, and provide a copy of their valid ID and SSC. The application process consists of background and drug screenings.

Child and Adult Care Food Program

CHICKEN PENNE

Ingredients

- 3 cups Penne pasta, whole-wheat, dry (12 oz.)
- 1 tsp Granulated garlic
- 2 cups Fresh broccoli florets
- 1 cup Cooked diced chicken, ½" pieces (4 oz.)
- 1 ½ cups Fat-free half and half
- 1 Tbsp. Enriched all-purpose flour
- V cup Low-sodium chicken broth
- 1 tsp Salt
- ½ tsp Ground black pepper
- ½ cup Reduced-fat cheddar cheese, shred-ded (2 oz.)
- ½ cup Low-fat mozzarella cheese, low-moisture, part-skim, shredded (2 oz.)



Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 °F.
- 2. In a large pot, bring 2 quarts water to a boil. Gradually stir in pasta and return to a boil. Cook uncovered for 8-10 minutes or until tender. Do not overcook. Drain well. Toss pasta with ½ teaspoon garlic.
- 3. Fill a medium pot with water and bring to a boil.
- Add broccoli florets and cook for 5 minutes. Drain well. Sprinkle with remaining garlic.
- 4. Transfer pasta and broccoli to a medium casserole dish (about 8" x 11") coated with nonstick cooking spray. Add chicken. Mix well.
- 5. In a small mixing bowl, mix $\frac{1}{2}$ cup half and half with flour. Whisk to remove lumps.
- 6. In a medium skillet, heat chicken broth, salt, pepper, and remaining half and half. Stir constantly. Stir in half and half/flour mixture. Stir constantly and bring to a boil.
- 7. Reduce heat to low. Stir frequently for 5 minutes. Sauce will thicken. Add cheese and stir until cheese melts. Remove from heat. Pour sauce over broccoli/pasta mixture.
- 8. Cover casserole dish with lid or with foil. Bake at 350 °F for 8 minutes. Heat to an internal temperature of 165 °F or higher for at least 15 seconds (use a food thermometer to check the internal temperature). Remove from oven. Serve hot.

Preparation Time: 20 minutes Cooking Time: 20 minutes Makes six 1 ½-cup servings

1 ½ cups provides 1 oz. equivalent meat/meat alternate, V cup vegetable, and 1 ¾ oz. equivalent grains.

- 1. Look around your house for items to sell. More than likely, you have stuff lying around that you no longer use or you've gotten tired of—clothing, movies, tools, and home décor, to list a few examples. You can use online websites like EBay and Poshmark to sell your items, or sell locally on Facebook Marketplace. If the weather is nice, you can always set up and have an old-fashioned yard sale, too.
- 2. Pick up babysitting or pet sitting jobs. Let your friends and family members know you're available to watch their children when they have plans or need a break (if you advertise your services on social media, it always helps to have references and CPR training). Plenty of people are also looking for someone to take care of their pets when they're out of town or working long hours, so you can offer to step in and do the job.
- **3. Take paid online surveys.** Websites like Inbox Dollars, Swagbucks, and Survey Junkie allow you to answer survey questions in exchange for money. You won't get rich by filling out surveys, but a few extra dollars each week can certainly help with expenses or even a vacation fund. (*Before entering any personal information, always do research to make sure that a website belongs to a credible, reputable company and isn't a scam.*)
- **4. Turn a hobby into a side business.** Do you enjoy baking, photography, knitting, candle-making, or crafting? If you're creative and like the idea of being your own boss, you can always make some extra money doing something you enjoy. It might even turn into a full-time career if you have the right skills and the market is there. If you're ready to branch out, websites like Etsy allow you to sell your creations to people all over the world.
- **5.** Use apps that give you cash back when you shop. A couple popular examples of cash-back apps are Ibotta and Fetch Rewards. After downloading the app, all you have to do is shop, then scan your receipts to earn cash or gift cards.

Weatherization

As the year 2020 came to an end, the WX crew was eager to start the new year! As COVID-19 is still on the rise, we strive to maintain a very healthy and clean work environment. Mr. Damron, reached out to the Weatherization program after noticing that all of his insulation had fallen to the ground throughout his crawlspace area. All of the belly board had come undone and the insulation was no longer serving its purpose.

An Energy Audit was completed on Mr. Damron's home. The Weatherization staff quickly noticed there were a lot of energy saving methods that could be done. With all of the insulation being on the ground, it caused the heating and cooling unit to run



almost non-stop. This is a heavy burden for a unit, ultimately increasing the energy bill. It was also noted during the inspection, that a lot of air was escaping around his door frame. After all data needed was collected, a full audit was completed using our Weatherization Assistant Program. The recommended measures were generated and a work order was in progress.

The biggest task, was to get all the insulation removed and a brand new belly installed for the



water lines, and placed blue board foam under the bath-tub with dense packed insulation. The WX crew wrapped the hot water tank, installed new LED lights, and completed other energy saving methods. Things were really starting to shape up, and Mr. Damron was already seeing improvements. Energy saving measures are a main focus for Weatherization, but health and safety plays a major role also. The WX crew installed smoke alarms and CO detectors to ensure client safety. Additionally, client education is key to long-term energy sav-

We later followed up with Mr. Damron, and he was beyond pleased with the overall outcome. He was thrilled with how well all the guys worked and how respectful everyone was. It's a great feeling to service our community. We will always take PRIDE in our hard work and dedication to making homes in our community safe and more energy efficient.
